Besides, the IQAC insists upon the use of ICT and social media to facilitate effective teaching-learning processes.

- The students of literature are shown films based on the prescribed syllabus in the classroom.
- The students are given more exposure by sending them on study tours, field visits, inter-collegiate and university level science exhibitions i.e. Avishkar, Debates, Elocution Competitions, seminars, and workshops.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The College has a well-designed curriculum delivery approach and mechanism, which is essentially learnercentric to ensure the best learning environment for its students. There are constant efforts to help create a fair and prolific learning community in the best interests of the College students, and also its faculty members. For this, new techniques, ideas, and resources are adopted by the College at various levels to establish and maintain a regular connection between students and faculty members via a robust curriculum delivery system.

Some of the main aspects of our curriculum delivery system include the following features:

- Academic calendar and teaching plan are prepared at the beginning of each academic year. All students are informed about the entire academic calendar well in advance.
- All theory classes, practical classes and Add-on courses are scheduled and monitored at each step by faculty members.
- Classroom pedagogy primarily includes lecture methods and lecture discussions, participative learning, experiential learning, ICT enabled lectures, field work and field studies.
- Practical classes in science faculty are planned early at the start of each semester. Likewise, project works and excursions are proposed in advance for research and better planning purpose. The topics for classroom seminars are also provided in advance for early preparation by students.
- As per the regular practice, every department in college identifies slow and advanced learners to address their specific needs and take up necessary initiatives to prepare them for future.
- All academic courses in commerce, science, and arts are imparted in two languages, Marathi and English. This is to ensure that students acquire subject knowledge and professional capabilities to meet their academic goals and outcomes in the best manner.
- Quality evaluation and enhancement are in place for college faculty members to encourage continuous improvement in the process of teaching and learning. For this, the observation process of classroom lectures assures in providing valuable feedback to faculty members and creating a culture of improvement in an objective manner.
- During the COVID-19 outbreak, online classroom lectures and counselling sessions were conducted to enable continuous learning for students in the absence of physical classroom sessions.
- All academic sessions in the last academic year were strictly followed as per the guidelines issued by the Central and State Government, and the University, and delivered its academic sessions successfully in all subjects.

- All curricular and co-curricular activities are planned out in the academic calendar to maintain an effective curricular delivery system.
- The final academic calendar is shared with college students, faculty members and all other stakeholders on college website.
- Further, the college fully adheres to the academic calendar for admission process, teaching plan, actual teaching days, vacations, Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE), university examinations and various co-curricular activities, etc.
- A separate Internal Examination Committee looks after CIE. The college fully adheres to the academic calendar for the conduction, evaluation and grievance redressal related to CIE. All college departments periodically organise unit tests and tutorials to ensure effective curriculum implementation as per the academic calendar.
- Internal examination schedule is shared with students in advance through notices, circulars and website. All students are informed about Internal evaluation mechanism at the start of every academic year, and include different kinds of evaluation methods, marking scheme, nature of question papers, and marking weightage.

- After evaluation, answer sheets are shown to the students, and their performance is discussed with them to ensure transparency and accountability in evaluation. This is to achieve the best results on the experimental basis.
- If any student remains absent from any college activity, such as sports, competitive examination, Avishkar or medical emergency, the concerned department conducts separate internal tests for them, and the marks are displayed on the Notice Board.
- Internal marks are submitted to the University via e-Suvidha Portal with utmost care by the internal examination committee. All marks entry is supervised by the concerned subject teacher to ensure zero error and limit grievances in the internal examination marking.
- The college has started a full MCQ pattern to conduct internal tests in COVID-19 through online mode in place of descriptive method in all subjects. Before COVID-19, it was descriptive.
- The college also encourages students to give seminars using ICT aids, rather than using traditional method.
- The college also conducted internal examinations and practice tests in online mode through Google forms, Testmoz during the lockdown period.
- The college examination committee effectively deploys and monitors continuous evaluation

process throughout the year as per the academic calendar.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

Institution integrates cross- cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into the curriculum. Through the curriculum and supporting activities, the students are encouraged to undertake a number of activities to inculcate these values. The prescribed syllabi of university in various subjects in the form of topics, chapters, poems and co-curricular activities contains cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender, Human Values, Environment, Sustainability and Professional Ethics.

Gender Sensitization:

Various activities are conducted by Yuvati Sabha (Girls Council) to sensitize issues regarding women. Special Lectures are organized on the 29th of August every year in memory of Late Sau Gojartai Bhamare, Founder Vice-President of Vidya Vikas Mandal, which highlights social problems such as women's safety, dowry, women's health, cyber-crime and cyber-security, hygiene, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, and women empowerment. The internal Complaint Committee as per the guidelines of UGC is formed to safeguard the rights of girls students. Special activities are organized on International Women's Day i.e. 8th March every year. Essay Competition, Swayamsiddha Abhiyan (Self-Reliant Initiative) are some of them.

Environment and Sustainability:

For the first-year students of each undergraduate program, environmental science is a compulsory subject prescribed by KBCNMU, Jalgaon. It fosters the value of environmental conservation and preservation amongst young minds. Some of the topics from literature subjects and some from science subjects have been developing awareness about sustainability and the environment as well as its related aspects.

The college organizes various initiatives that focus on the environment and sustainability such as Tree plantation, Plastic Free Campus, Spit Free Campus, Rain Water Harvesting, Cleanliness Drive, Gandagimukt Bharat Abhiyan, Aao Nadi ko Jaane (Know Your River), Swachchh Bharat Abhiyan, No Vehicle Day, Use of Bicycle, etc. Through these programs, students and faculties were made aware of various aspects of the conservation of environment.

Green Audit and Energy audit are conducted by the Institute. The Department of Botany conducts an activity on the floral diversity of the campus to educate students regarding the biodiversity of the campus. Uses of Medicinal plants are imparted to the students. To know more about plants and trees on the campus, QR codes have been attached to the respective plants and trees so that students can scan the codes

and get the scientic information of the species.

Human Values and Professional Ethics:

The ethics and values are well inculcated amongst the students that are reflected in the literature and humanities subjects. To understand it more, the college organizes programs like seminars, special talks, etc. The national conference on **'Human Rights: Issues and Challenges'** and the National Conference on **'Impact of Social Media on Language, Literature and Culture'** are prime examples.

The teachers from the college who are members of the Board of Studies also contributed to framing the syllabus by including the above cross-cutting issues in the syllabus. Above topics are well oriented through the platforms like NSS, NCC and Student Development Department. Students are offered a wide platform to understand these issues well through various extra-curricular, extension and outreach activities.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Students are the main stakeholder in the education process and our vision and mission imbibe us to prepare students for their academic progress. Students admitted to the college belong from diverse background. Therefore, taking into consideration the different needs of the students it becomes necessary to identify slow and advanced learners at the entry level. After the admission process, advanced learners and slow learners are identified by each department. Special initiatives are organized for both advanced learners and slow learners.

The methods for the identification of the learning level of the students are used such as class-room discussion, question and answer method by considering their subject knowledge and previous year's performance. From second year onwards; we consider their performance in the classroom and the university examinations. The academic performance of the students helps in identifying the slow and advanced learners. The **'Principal Address'** is organized for newly admitted students in which the principal focuses on various relevant topics such as code of conduct, rules and regulations, and students' support services along with development and achievements of the college

Activities organized for slow learners:

- Remedial Coaching
- Personal Counseling
- Simplified notes provided
- Question Banks Comprehensive Question banks are kept in all departments including previous year's university question papers, model questions and Multiple-Choice Questions.

Following activities are organized for advanced learners:

- Coaching regarding MPSC/UPSC and other competitive examinations and Students get an opportunity to interact with Civil Service officers which kindle them to reach the same through Chanakya Competitive Examination Guidance Center and Career Katta (Career Counseling Forum)
- Encouragement for debate, elocution, and quiz competitions
- Participation in various conferences, seminars, and workshops
- Participation in research conventions like Avishkar and research oriented activities
- N-List subscription

Apart from this, Add-on courses, as well as Certificate Courses, are being conducted by some of the departments to reduce the gap between the basic and advanced courses. Online demo tests are also provided to prepare them to face university examinations confidently.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Student centric teaching method emphasizes a variety of different method types that shift the role of teachers from givers of information to facilitators of student learning or creators of an environment for learning. Dissemination of information and knowledge is transformed by using technology in student centric methods. While teaching, the teacher also emphasizes on the actual participation of students in the learning process.

Experiential Learning, Participative Learning and **Problem-Solving Methods** used in the institution as follows.

Students are the epicentre of the teaching-learning process, with this perspective college has been organizing various initiatives, programs that fulfil learning needs, interests and aspirations of students and widen their learning experience. To make students totally involved in the teaching-learning process, alternate teaching techniques such as experiential learning and participatory learning are used supplementing with the traditional lecture method. These methods make teaching an exciting and interactive exercise.

All the departments organize student-centric methods in the class as well as outside the class. Subject associations regularly conduct various activities to augment students' knowledge and keep them abreast with current academic and research advancements. Personality development programs are organized at different levels for the holistic development of students.

Student centered learning strategies have been initiated. Innovative methods used such as debates, student seminars on syllabus topics, quizzes, Reading habit activity, etc are conducted in the classroom. E-learning resources, Lecture notes, online tests through google forms, and important links are uploaded on Google Classroom, which provides the necessary information to students with 24x7 access to learn at their own pace.

Industrial visits are regularly organized by the Department of Chemistry. Study tours are organized by the departments like History, Geography, Political Science, Marathi, and English to get first-hand knowledge of the things and experiential learning . Well-equipped laboratories of science departments enhance the experiential learning of the students.

Students are encouraged to participate in Outreach Innovative programs like **Shanivaari Vidnyan Vari** (Science on Saturday) which aims to enhance the scientific temperament among high school students through a practical method. Guest lectures by eminent academicians and scientists provide exposure to students to the latest developments in their areas of studies.

Creative use of ICT in teaching-learning processes enhances the comprehension of the conceptual and theoretical understanding of the students as well as also kindles students' enthusiasm and creates better involvement in the learning process. Students of literature are shown movies and films related to their course content to make them understand the actual points of literary text and to make the teaching-learning process more interesting. The students are also motivated to get involved in research activities through project works and paper presentations as well as participation in activities such as **Avishkar**.

Participative learning is increased by motivating students to participate in seminars, Webinars, workshops, and conferences organized by the college and other institutions. Students have actively interacted with teachers and enjoyed the participatory, experiential learning. Chanakya Competitive Examination Guidance Center and Career Katta (Career Counseling Forum) organize various programs that aims at the skill enhancement of the students.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

ICT dramatically has changed the scenario of the teaching field. It plays a vital role in imparting education in the post-Corona scenario. Classroom teaching is enhanced by the creative use of ICT by the teachers. All the teachers of our institute use ICT-enabled tools to make it easier to instruct the students and at the same time allow students to collaborate amongst themselves for better comprehension.

IQAC plays a significant role to motivate teaching faculty to upgrade themselves with digital and ICT skills for enhancing their teaching-learning process. Teachers at first learnt various skills with the help of information and communication technologies. The use of ICT in the teaching - learning process has been envisaged to attempt at upgrading the teaching pedagogy in our college. This would not only make the learning experience through our institution more exciting and permanent, but also enhance the teaching capabilities of the teachers as facilitators of learning. It would also promote self - learning and help the students to gain knowledge at their own learning pace. The ICT tools increase students' motivation, self-confidence and self-esteem to learn in such critical situations. Social media platforms such as Whatsapp

and telegram are used to keep in touch with the students for timely updates.

The college has started its own YouTube channel where all the online programs have been broadcasted. The college website hosts various kinds of e-resources that open the gate of reference material to them.

To enhance the teaching skills and ICT skills, IQAC encourages faculties to attend various Faculty Development Programs, and Teachers Training Programs during the COVID-19 pandemic situation. Most of the faculty members completed their courses. All the newly recruited faculty members are motivated to participate in the Faculty Induction Program under MHRD. All of them have completed it. These FDPs have made teachers confident about usage of various digital tools for their online teaching. ICT makes them able to guide students about the materials available on internet, e-books, e-journals, e-magazines and social sites like linked-in which are helpful in better learning. Digital tools such as Google Classroom, Google Meet, ZOOM, and OBS, are used effectively. Teachers have prepared learning notes and e-content by using various ICT tools such as ZOOM, OBS,Testmoz, Quizzes, Google Forms. Some of our teachers have their own YouTube channels. The faculty and learners wish to improve upon themselves in this COVID-19 pandemic situation.

Online Tests and quizzes are conducted and online competitions are organized successfully. The institution organizes webinars on various topics for the students to have constructive discussions with experts.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Assessment and evaluation are prime aspects of the teaching-learning process. In this regard, the college follows the norms and regulations of Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University and a transparent mechanism of Internal assessment and evaluation is well executed.

Transparency:

IQAC prepares the academic calendar at the beginning of the academic year and communicated through the college website and notice boards. It includes a schedule of various activities and internal tests as well as university examinations. The examination committee prepares the schedule of the internal tests as per the directions given by the University. The schedule is communicated to the students through the notice board, WhatsApp Groups of the courses, Telegram Group, Google Classroom and also through personal interaction. For theory courses, minimum of two tests for each semester are conducted After the assessment of the papers, these answersheets are distributed among the students. Internal assessment marks for each course are used by faculty members to assess students' performance.

Robustness:

The institution ensures that each department conducts at least minimum number of internal tests in accordance with the university guidelines. The internal examination process starts with the departmental meeting conducted by the HODs. The faculty is directed by the examination committee to prepare question papers in a confidential manner. The exam timetable is displayed on the department notice board.

Practical examination and Viva Voce are conducted as per the syllabi. The marks allotted to each component are awarded based on the performance of the students in the internal tests. The teachers are informed to prepare teaching plans and asked to follow them strictly. Through the mentor-mentee program, teachers motivate students to appear for internal tests as well as university examinations. In the pandemic situation, the initiative particularly, **Sanvaad Parv** (**Dialogue Session**) was organized through an online mode. During the Lockdown in the COVID-19 period, internal tests were conducted through Google forms. Few students suffered from internet issues and other technical problems. IT committee of the college along with Grievence Redressal Committee resolved the issues related with online examination. The timetable of the internal examination is strictly followed. In Pre-COVID situation, Mobiles were not permitted in the examination room.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

Response:

Conducting examination is important for attainment of COs and POs. The institution has a mechanism to deal with internal and external examination related grievances. The institution conducts Internal examinations as decided by examination committee in consultation with the IQAC and as per the guidelines provided by KBCNMU, Jalgaon. It is informed to the faculty through Departmental meetings. The schedule of the examinations is then informed to the students through social media platforms and through notices.

To tackle student grievances regarding the internal examination system:

Newly admitted students are familiarised with the Internal Evaluation Mechanism along with the University Examination Schedule.

Internal Examination Committee: The Examination Committee conducts timely examinations after completing the syllabus. Students interact with the faculty on necessary updates regarding their syllabus and projects on time. Adequate preparation time is allocated before the Internal tests and examinations. The student doubts and queries are adequately supported through Remedial Coaching, Tutorials, and the Mentor-Mentee system.

Address of Student Grievances: After the timely conduct of the internal examination, the answer-book evaluation by faculty is undertaken with due care and diligence. The marks awarded and the answer scripts are scrutinized by the students to their satisfaction with any inadvertent errors rectified. The marks are entered into the university's online portal through the head of the department and his associates.

Redressal Mechanism: The published marks are displayed on the notice boards for further scrutiny and rectification before being uploaded to the university website for compilation. The efficient and transparent time-bound method is adopted. The internal marks awarded by the institution are uploaded on the university portal.

Grievance Redressal Committee: Individual grievances, if any, are handled by the Grievance Redressal Cell with care and sympathy to be redressed as quickly as possible to the satisfaction of the students concerned. Any grievances regarding practical work are immediately resolved by the respective teacher and the head of the department. Grievances related to oral, project, and practical examinations are resolved at the department level. Continuous follow-up is taken with the university till the grievance is settled. For students whose marks are not entered or incorrectly entered due to oversight in the University mark list, the college sends a photocopy of the mark list as prepared by the teacher with an application to rectify the error at the university level. Any grievance related to the university question paper like out-of-syllabus, repeated questions, the improper split of marks, marks missed, and wrong question number during semester exams

are addressed to the Principal, in turn, the concerned student proceeds the same to the university immediately.

Mechanism of the communication of POs and COs:

- As stated by the University in its syllabus, Course Outcomes are communicated through the early lectures.
- It is also displayed on the college website.
- Program Outcomes, Course Outcomes, and Program Specific Outcomes are also displayed at prominent locations in the form of QR Codes so that students can easily access them through their mobile phones.
- At the time of scheduling the general timetable, the college ensures the allotment of hours based on the weightage given to each topic in the program outcome/syllabus.
- Keeping the Programme Specific Outcomes in mind, individual faculty members design lesson plans with focused learning outcomes. The implementation of this lesson plan is monitored at the level of Heads of departments as well as the Principal.
- The faculty members emphasize PO, PSO, and CO so that the teaching-learning process becomes more enlightened.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes help faculty members and students come to a common understanding about the purpose and goals of an academic program. By providing a clear and comprehensive idea about POs, PSOs and COs, faculty begin to provide a transparent pathway for student success.

Course outcomes are the cornerstones of course design and assessment, and help students focus on what is important. So attainment of COs and POs is a crucial step to assure the quality enhancement process of the institution. The academic progress of the students is regularly monitored by subject teachers, as well as respective Heads of Departments for effective program outcomes. The CBCS syllabus is executed by Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University. The syllabus contains Course Outcomes. The COs and POs are displayed on the College Website. The QR codes of POs and COs are displayed at various places on campus. Students are aware of it in the classroom also.

The college ensures the outcome of the programs through the analysis of the internal and external examination results and achievements in the placements, sports, cultural and extension activities. The attainment of COs and POs is measured by direct and indirect methods. The knowledge and skill described by the course outcomes are mapped to specific problems on university internal examinations etc. Average attainment in the direct method is equal to university examination (60%) + Internal assessment (40%).

Course outcomes are attained through a direct method with the following steps

- The evaluation of the program outcomes, program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes are measured by methods such as Summative and formative assessment. Two internal tests are conducted regularly for each semester.
- The question papers are set for the internal assessment test with the intention of testing the attainment level of the students.
- Unit tests, quizzes, laboratory work, etc are conducted through various departments
- Filed work, projects, trips, tours arrangements
- Participation of students in various co-curricular, extra-curricular organized by NSS and NCC as well as sports, cultural, debate, and elocution
- Final semester examination as well as practical examinations conducted by University
- Marks obtained in the internal tests, and semester examination are the course outcomes attained.

The indirect assessment method comprises students' feedback and survey, employability, and progression to higher education.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

Social commitment, Values orientation and Character building are the prominent core values of the college. It is our humble attempt to translate our core values into reality and our college believes that, through extension activities, the students are transformed into agents of social change to provide lasting solutions to social problems. Our college organizes various extension activities in the neighborhood communities. NSS and NCC have been playing a key role in establishing the network with the neighborhoot communities.

The NSS unit of our college organizes seven days 'A Special Winter Camp' in a nearby adopted village. 125 NSS volunteers stay day and night at the selected village and carry out various activities such as Tree Plantation, Public Awareness Programs on various important issues, Cleanliness Drive, Public Health and Hygiene, Environment Enrichment, Women Empowerment, Eradication of superstition, Swachch Bharat Abhiyan, and Public Survey etc. The NSS Unit has also started Vachan Katta (Reading Forum) in the adopted village to enhance the reading habits of the villagers.

Our college has been organizing a blood donation camp every year for the last 25 years. NSS volunteers and NCC cadets participate in the Blood Donation camp enthusiastically. It impacts the positive aspect of the sense of gratitude towards our social commitment. A cleanliness drive is carried out on many occasions at different levels.

The Electoral Literacy Club was formed in order to aware the students and stakeholders about relevance of electroral process in democracy and through it, the Voters Awareness Program has been jointly organized by NSS, Department of Student Development and the Department of Political Science. We have received the **Best Nodal Officer Award** for this initiative at the hands of the District Collector's Office, Dhule.

The college has initiated major intervention programmes like Road Safety, Plastic Free Campus, Gandagimukt Bharat, Freedom Run, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Legal Awareness Program, Disaster Management, and Reading Motivation Day.

In the pandemic situation, NSS volunteers and NCC cadets have contributed constructively to social awareness and social commitment. E-Workshops and Webinars are organized to educate the stakeholders as well as the public regarding various issues. 'My Family, My Responsibility ', 'COVID-19 and Mental

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The college was established on 15th, June 1971. It is spread over 3.43 acres land. The institute has a master plan for the development of the college and as per the master plan the institute has created an ideal network of infrastructure consisting of 12 (Twelve) well connected buildings, playground, water closet and aqua guard drinking water facilities with well maintained garden having number of trees. For creation of this infrastructure the institute has obtained grants from UGC, New Delhi. In order to meet future educational needs the institute has chalked out a perspective plan and requirements made by the faculty and students from time to time that have been fulfill adequately.

There are two hostels out of which one hostel for boys and another for girls to accommodate 57 Students. There is adequate physical infrastructure in the form of classrooms, laboratories, library and computer labs to cater to the academic needs of around 1200 students of 13 UG, 01 PG and 07 Ph.D. Programs.

Every year, the timetable committee prepares a timetable for the academic year taking into account the optimum utility of resources available. There are 19 classrooms equipped with Black boards, Dais and requisite electrification. In addition to this there are 05 LCD projectors in IQAC, Zoology and seminar hall that are using for ICT enable learning as per the need. There is one ICT enabled seminar hall used for guest lectures, seminars, meetings and conferences.

The college has in all 06 well equipped laboratories available in Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Geography and Commerce department. It is worth to mention that the Zoology and Physics laboratories have been recognized by KBCNM University for Ph.D. Programs. Commerce department is equipped with computer lab having 10 (ten) computers of latest configuration. Geography laboratory is equipped with independent GPS which is useful for our students.

There are total 35 computers and 02 Laptops in use. The computers available for students lead to student's computer ratio of 33:1. However, the lab time table is so prepared as to ensure optimum usage of the computer lab leading to students computer ratio 1: 1.

The institute has central library having total area of 290 sq. meter (3121.53 sq. Feet)(Ground Floor) with 40144 books and 95 M.Phil/Ph.D. thesis. In addition, Chankya Competitive Examination Guidance Center and some other departments such as Chemistry, Physics and Economics have a separate departmental library to provide subject related books and CDs. All the classrooms and laboratories are spacious as per the specification of statutory bodies. Classrooms are of different dimensions adequate to accommodate sanctioned strength of different courses.

Using the available facilities, our students have own the medals and trophies at university and state level. The college has organized many activities of university and state level on behalf of Kavyitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University Jalgaon. Various cultural programs are organized in the college to promote the innate qualities in the students.

The college has a history of glorious achievements of students in sports at university, inter-university levels. A spacious and well equipped gymkhana department is a big asset of the college. The college has also a full time post of physical director which very few other colleges have. The original latent sports potential of the youth of this region is properly nurtured by the strategic efforts of the college and the mentoring of the coach.

The total area of the **Gymkhana Office** is of 28946.15 Sq.ft. with play ground.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

IT infrastructure is spread over all the academic departments, library, and gymkhana as well as administrative sections of the college. These facilities are continuously upgraded to meet the demands generated out of introduction of new curriculum, laboratories, office management software (ERP) and university systems. The up gradation is in the form of hardware updating, addition of terminals, addition of bandwidth, replacement by high capacity cables (CAT 6 cable for internal LAN and OFC for longer distance), addition of service provider to keep substitute open, extension of continuous power supply facility, etc.

There are total 35 desktop computers and 04 laptops connected to the infrastructure. Whenever needed the configuration of machines in department like Commerce are upgraded with the change in university curriculum. Presently, these machines have high end configuration as 02 Processor, 8 GB RAM, 500 GB HDD. Networking of these terminals is done using 24 port switch, and D Link router. As the campus is divided in several buildings and new facilities have come up in last 5 years

different LANs are set as per the requirement. Backup in form of UPS is available for all terminals (>7.5KVA)

The office has used Mastersoft ERP solution for office automation since 2018. This was replacing by windows based one. This replacement has created sufficient facilities to handle student's data, exam data, accounting operation and university requirements. It has helped the administrative as well as academic section to generate the required output which is in turn helping the digitization at all levels.

Master soft ERP solutions LIBMAN library management software (version 1.0) is the software used in library which is a multiplatform, multilingual, and client server based software. It provides highly versatile and user friendly online public access catalog (OPAC) for simple and advanced search which is available to all the departments connected through Wi-Fi with the library. Library also provides M OPAC to students and faculty members. All the books in the active collection have been bar-coded.

The college has an active website. It was developed by professional agency and updated by a college staff. With high demand for dynamism the website was handed over to a professional agency, for maintenance. The Wi-Fi facility is free for all and can function on android smart phones.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

The institute has a definite and systematic mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of such facilities. Some of them are maintained by an Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) given to concerned agencies, some are maintained by external agencies on demand as per the need and the others are maintained by the faculty members of the institution and skilled staff like plumber, carpenter and electrician appointed by the management. A technical person has been appointed for regular maintenance of IT infrastructure in the campus.

A 'maintenance register' is maintained wherein complaints regarding repairs and maintenance of various facilities in the campus are registered by the staff members. These are attended by concerned technical persons on regular basis.

Facilities like classrooms, seminar halls are cleaned daily by menial staff. Breakage if any is reported by the cleaning staff in office. Appropriate action is taken immediately. Painting of buildings is done on periodical basis.

Maintenance and Calibration of Scientific instruments:

Science departments have a number of sophisticated equipments which need a regular maintenance. The high-end instruments are mainly maintained by the service engineers of the respective manufacturers who visit the institute for maintenance periodically or on call.

The instruments are also calibrated as part of their maintenance. Such calibration is done regularly or as per the need by the expert faculty members in the respective departments

The details of which are as follows-

- The double beam/ single beam UV-Visible spectrophotometers in the physics laboratory are calibrated as per the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) of calibration as prescribed by the Indian Pharmacopeia (IP) after every six months, particularly at beginning of each semester.
- The potentiometers, PH meters, conductometers and the balance in these labs are calibrated as per their manuals almost every week before the practical sessions. In the department of biological sciences the colorimeter and pH meter are calibrated every month and the spectrophotometer every week as per the manual. Calibration of 'Autoclave' is done six monthly by validation, using '*Bacillusstereothermophilus*' strips/ culture. Also calibration of 'biosafety cabinets (laminar air flow)' is done every month by checking efficiency of HEPA filters.
- The instruments in Physics department that mainly need calibration to be done regularly i.e. Oscilloscopes, 'Function Generators' and other electronic equipments that are widely used in many experiments at UG level. The calibration of the instruments is done every six months, at beginning of each semester by the faculty members as per the procedure given in the service manual. The function generators are calibrated as and when needed. The resistance boxes are calibrated after every six months by the laboratory assistants, measuring resistances with help of a standard Ohm meter and by replacing them by resistances of correct values.

The safety and security of the students and staff is the major concern of the Institution. CCTV cameras are installed on the campus for 24 hours surveillance. There are total 19 cameras are fixed at various locations. and the complete area of the college campus is covered. The footage is monitored in the Principal's office. The CCTV footage backup of 30 days is available to monitor.

The college Campus is fully fenced for full protection from outsiders. trespassers are not allowed without permission.

The discipline is maintained by the college discipline committee. Complaint box installed in the college and follow up taken by Student Grievance committee. The institution has an Internal Complaints Committee to redress grievances of both girls and boys. The committee has the authority to take necessary actions regarding the same.

Counselling:

counselling grooms and builds confidence in the students hence teachers who are also mentors play a key role in helping the students to manage interpersonal and intrapersonal relationships, improve communication, gain a positive attitude towards life, set goals, show progress and acquire resilience. Through the Mentor-Mentee Program, mentors identify students who need counseling and help them to go through the situation wisely as well as the mentor interacts and supports the assigned mentees in resolving all their academic, personal and stress-related problems and issues.

The Internal Complaint Committee and Yuvati Sabha play a key role in organizing programs such as counselling sessions, invited talks and training sessions in self-defence for students. Swayamsiddha Workshop (Self Defense Workshop) provides confidence amongst girls students for their self-defence and boosts the sense of self-reliance.

Solid waste management

To reduce waste at College, students and staff are educated on proper waste management practices, through meetings, advertisement on notice boards, displaying slogan boards in the college campus. All waste is collected on a daily basis from various sources and is separated as plastic, paper, dry and wet waste.

Solid waste is the useless, unwanted and discarded material resulting from day to day activities of students and staff. It is essential to reduce, reuse and recycle solid waste. Thus we try to follow the above three "R's".

There are labeled dustbins that are used for different types of waste in our college. Daily garbage is collected by menial staff and handed over to authorized personnel of Sakri Nagar Panchayat for further processing.

In our college campus hundred shop plants are planted, our college campus is green campus but dry leaves of plants are collected by menial staff, sometimes the NSS students and students of Earn and Learn scheme also involve in collecting such dry leaves, which are decomposed in the Vermicompost unit. Vermicomposting is a method of using worms to transform organic solid waste into a nutrient-rich fertilizer. Thus extra solid waste from college campus is also decomposed in ditches.

Liquid waste management

The waste Chemicals mixed water from laboratory passes through concealed pipe line into soak pit and recycled water is percolated and used for the watering of trees or non-portable usage. Liquids are diluted by getting mixed with the washroom and toilet liquid wastes into the common drainage or ditches. Biomedical Wastes are handed over to authorized personnel of Sakri Nagar panchayat .

E waste management

All E-wastes are collected properly and stored in the store room, and disposed accordingly. Most of the electronic items are sold as scrap to ensure their safety recycling. Old monitors and CPUs are repaired by our technician and reused in various departmental and computer Laboratories

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

Best Practice-I

Title of the Practice

LEARNING THROUGH SOCIAL COMMITMENT

On every 29th of August, we organize Blood Group Detection Camp and Blood Donation Camp for the last twenty-five years in memory of Late Amadar Sau Gojartai Ramrao Bhamare; founder and Vicepresident of Vidya Vikas Mandal, Sakri. On the same day special lectures on the health and hygiene for girls' students at our college. These activities are the reflections of the thoughts imparted by our Founder Vice-president Late Amadar Sau Gojartai Bhamare through her services to society. This value of social commitment is practiced every year.

• Objectives of the Practice:

- To be aware of students about their own blood groups is the necessity of the hour. Because in this hectic life, one must know its own blood group for the sake of saving his or her own life as well as for others. With this view, our college organizes a blood group detection camp for the last twenty-five years in collaboration with Government District Hospital, Dhule.
- To imbibe the importance of Blood Donation amongst students is the prime objective of this practice. In this modern world, there is a dire need of establishing of the value of giving or donating as we are a human society that builds upon the foundation of cooperation. Donating blood for saving the lives of others is a commendable service to mankind. Students can serve society by paying back as a value of social commitment can be best understood through this activity.
- Women cover half of the population. Her health and hygiene determine the quality of health and hygiene of the society. Hence the college believes in this maxim and organizes various lectures by experts and reputed gynecologist doctors regarding the health issues of girl students.

The Context:

The Institution focuses on social commitment and community engagement, which connects the academic programs with community service so that students, faculty, and community partners can forge linkage between theory and practice, knowledge and action, and between the resources of the Institution and the social development. The social-based learning combines traditional classroom instruction with social service to enhance the learning of the students and civic participation.

August 29 has been celebrated as a memorable day for all the students, parents, teaching, and non-teaching staff of college for the last 25 years. In the formation of our organization, the founder vice-president Late Gojartai Ramrao Bhamare, the then director of the organization and the first woman MLA of the taluka, passed away on August 29, 1996. Since then, for the last 25 years, Aamdar Late Sau Gojartai Bhamare Memorial Day has been celebrated every year in our college with various activities.

The Practice:

On this day, all the students entering the first year of college used to check their blood groups free of cost. This activity is also aimed at knowing the Hemoglobin level of students that will be benefitted for their health in the future. Students, teaching and non-teaching staff of the college voluntarily donate blood to pay homage to the late Gojartai Bhamare. In addition, various sports competitions are also organized in the college. Youngsters from all over the taluka also participate in it. Health awareness camps are organized in our college for all the students coming for higher education from Sakri taluka and many other places through Yuvati Sabha under the Student Development Department. It provides guidance from expert professors and gynecologists on the changes regarding adolescence and other health issues of girl students. After that, various healths related questions are answered by resolving the doubts of the college girls. Till now more than ten thousand college girls are said to have benefited from these lectures.

Evidence of success:

For the last twenty-five years, the college has been organizing a grand Blood Donation camp on 29th August. More than 1000 students voluntarily donated blood & more than 7000 students have been detected their blood groups free of cost. It is stated by the doctors that donated blood saved the lives of many needy people in society. Therefore, this continuous social initiative is appreciated every year. For all these activities, the reputed doctors from the Government Blood Bank of Government Medical College, Dhule, and skilled technicians actively participate along with the administration of the college every year for organizing free blood group detection camp and blood donation camp.

Impact of the Practice:

The practice of blood donation on the Death Anniversary of Late Sau. Gojartai Bhamare has made an impact on the community, students, and teachers. The donated blood is being utilized by people and institutions not only in Sakri but in the area of the District. The blood is also being utilized by the patients suffering from Thalassemia, AIDS Hemophilia, etc. The voluntary blood donation camps have resulted in a great impact on the students as well as teachers. The impact is apparent on personality development, social and moral education, and civic responsibility and is reflected in reduced indiscipline and an enhanced sense of responsibility among the students towards the mother institute. It has created the sensitized citizens and sense of organizing such types of events in the society as well as in college. Students have scientifically understood the importance of blood donation. Lots of the students have known their blood groups. Girl students have become health and hygiene conscious. The practice imbibed the value of social commitment amongst the main stakeholders.

Problems encountered:

As students are from rural and tribal areas, before one week we have to make them aware about the importance of blood group detection and blood donation. Some of the students have hemophobia so it becomes difficult for them to donate their blood and detect their blood groups. The doctors from the government hospital, Dhule take initiative in counseling the students regarding this phobia.

Problems encountered such as inadequacy of resources; non-availability of the latest techniques and technology for operating the blood transfusion services and lack of extensive awareness programs. Efforts are being made to attract more youths for blood donation as well as to prepare trained personnel for supervision. We believe in endeavoring to make the blood transfusion services viable through a non-profit recovery system. We know the limitation and constraints of our practice in running the academic institution.

Regarding the health and hygiene issues of girl students, as most of girl students are from rural and tribal areas, they feel inferiority complex to discuss with doctors and experts regarding their issues.

Best Practice-II

A STEP TO SUCCESS

Sakri Tahasil is widely known as Tribal dominated Tahasil. As large numbers of the population belong to the tribal community, the majority of admissions in our college are from the ST category. Many students come from rural and economically backward families. Some of them are first learners. That is why our first priority is not only to make our students book-centric but to make them aware of the outside world competition by arranging workshops on 'competitive exams and on various career options. For keeping them mentally and physically fit we organize yoga sessions and sports competitions.

Objectives of the Practice:

- To provide academic facilities to the students from rural and tribal backgrounds aspiring for Central & state service examinations such as GATE, JAM, Civil service, Engineering services, Group-1, etc.
- To provide the guidance to the students from a rural and tribal background in various examinations such as GATE, Civil service, Engineering services, etc
- To create and sustain their interest in their respective field
- To create awareness among students about their social and civil responsibilities
- To help learners make appropriate and realistic career choices and career directions
- To acquire leadership qualities and democratic values

The Context:

Our college always makes sure to provide all the necessary materials for the competitive exams as many of our students are not economically strong enough to purchase them. Through Chanakya Competitive examination Guidance Center, we have opened a dedicated reading room and library for the students who are willing to study for competitive exams.

The Practice:

We have organized many state, university, and college-level workshops on career and competitive exam guidance. Many elite speakers kept their views and experiences in front of students. More than one thousand students are benefited from these workshops. With a joint venture of Maharashtra State Higher and Technical Education Department and Maharashtra Information and Technology Support Center, we established 'Career Katta' (Career Counselling Forum) in college. The main purpose of Career Katta is to create more and more entrepreneurs. Our college tried to introduce all the aspects of the Career Katta to principals, coordinators, and students of many colleges of affiliated universities. On the occasion of National Youth Day, we have organized state level workshop on "Youth and Career". Nineteen thousand students from all over Maharashtra participated in this online workshop.

Evidence of Success:

Through this initiative, students are encouraged and motivated to aspire for various competitive examinations. One such program was appreciated by Hon. Udayji Samant (Maharashtra State Higher

Education Minister). For organizing these kinds of activities in mission mode for students, our college Principal is confered by the state-level **Best Principal Award** by Maharashtra Information Technology Support Center, Kolhapur. The coordinator is promoted as District Coordinator of Career Katta. Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University has appreciated the constant efforts initiated by the Chanakya Competitive Examination Guidance Center at the meeting of the Senate and it is also recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the Senate. The NCC cadets are also admitted and undertake the activities hence more than 15 NCC cadets of our college are selected for Indian Defense Services. Many of the students have aspired for MPSC and UPSC examinations. The students are benefitted from the center have been successfully recruited for various jobs.

Problems encountered :

- Students are, from rural and tribal areas, have lacuna in communication.
- Most of the students face an inferiority complex as they are first-generation learners
- Need to emphasize counseling to attend the lectures during holidays and vacation periods as they have contributed to their family duties.

Resources required:

There is a strong need to connect with other libraries which are devoted to the competitive examination and related activities.

PROGRESS - Programs for ST Students

Tribal students admitted to the college cover more than 40%. Most of them are first-generation learners. They face language barriers, a sense of inferiority complex, etc. The institution, as it believes in its core values and objectives, strives to boost its confidence by organizing special programs for them. The initiatives such as:

Intensive training program for Tribal children in collaboration with Vigyan Prasar, New Delhi aimed at inculcating scientific temperament amongst tribal children. The **Rajyasabha News channel** broadcasted its success story.

'Science fair for Tribal Students' is a program organized with an aim to inspire tribal students to create a passion for subjects like science and technology.

Three days University Level Confidence boosting and motivational workshop for Tribal students' is organized to foster the importance of self-confidence, self-discipline, and goal-setting.

POWER- Programs On Women Empowerment

The institution has more than 40% of female students. Promoting gender equality and empowering women is one of the prominent eight Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). Empowering women is essential to the health and social development of families, communities, and countries. A key part of this empowerment is possible only through education.

The college initiates various programs that foster the value of gender equality amongst the students. These programs also aims at to respect the dignity of women. Some of the prominent programs are as follows.

Felicitation of the Mothers bearing only Girl child: The criteria set for the parents being felicitated – the child or children of the couple would have to be girls and no more than two. The program emphasises the importance of gender equality. It also aims at to eradicate the biased attitude towards a specific gender. The progress and healthy growth of society is depend uopn the balanced perspective towards women.

Swayamsiddha Abhiyan for Girls Students: This initiative is a step ahead, towards the much-needed and deserved empowerment girls. It is a seven day training program on self defence skills such as Judo, Karate and Martial Arts. Girl students are trained under professional trainers. To make them strong, mentally and physically, is the prime objective of the Initiative. The program boosts the confidence among selected girl

students at the end of program.

Respect for Dignity of Women:

There is a strong need to imbibe the fact that Every woman has the right to live in dignity—free of fear, coercion, violence, and discrimination. For this, Governments can enforce laws against violence against women, but we believe that education can change social norms and attitudes. With this point of view, our institute initiate programs like A workshop on Prevention of Sexual Harrassment at working Places, Legal Awareness Programs, Lectures on Cyber Crime. March 8 is celebrated as International Women's Day to mark women's achievements—socially, economically, culturally, and politically.

Enrichment of Constitutional Values:

Education is a powerful instrument of social change and human progress, it is also a powerful tool to cultivate values in an individual. Therefore our institution leads the responsibility to impart learning and cultivation of constitutional values through the following activities.

Indian Constitution Preamble Reading activity: On 26th November, the Department of Political Science organized this activity to inform students regarding Constitutional Values.

Distribution of Indian Constitution to the eminent Guests: As a token of respect, the Institution offers a copy of the Indian Constitution to the eminent guests that have visited the Institution. This activity aims to promote constitutional values.

Quizzes are organized on the Indian Constitution.

Reading Forum (Vachan Katta)

It is an activity primarily aimed at enhancing the reading habits of the villagers. It started at Ashtane, Tal-Sakri.
